Your company far exceeded my expectations in your professionalism and quality of performances. I have attached a section of a letter that I have sent to our Board of Directors and other sponsors of the event.

As we are all aware, bullying is an epidemic and one that Union County, Arkansas is not immune to. Just this last week, a school in Ohio made national headlines due to a student shooting where multiple students were injured or killed. The investigation is still ongoing in that case but I am willing to guess that the student that perpetrated the shooting was an above average student that was bullied. This is the situation in over half of the school shootings around the country. The thugs are turning our good students into killers! Where does one start to address this epidemic? ANYWHERE! And that is exactly what we did at the Municipal Auditorium on February 17th .

2,478 children and their teachers from 10 schools throughout the county attended the performances of "Don't Be A Bully! Speak Up! Speak Out!". A play performed by young actors that has a very positive message about not allowing bullying to continue without telling someone (teacher, parent, principle or resource officer) about it. Their message was also about accepting others despite their differences. This program was performed by professional actors equaling the age of most of their audience. In addition most of these young actors have been a victim or a perpetrator of bullying and all of them understand the need to get this message out to as many kids as possible. The age of the performers as well as their personal experience with bullying provided a comfortable atmosphere where the audience could relate to the stories that were being told.

As with any program we do, getting feedback is the only way to know if we are making the correct impact. In the situations were the audience comes from a multiple of sources I ask the school administrators for feedback from the individual schools. Bonnie Haynie with the Eldorado School District contacted the participating schools to ask them the following questions:
1. Did your students enjoy the performance?
2. As an instructor, was the presentation "worth the time"?
3. Was the lesson that was being illustrated understood by your students?
4. What is your overall impression of the presentation?
5. Comments.
Their responses were:
1. All responses said that the audience enjoyed the performance (teachers and students).
2. All responses stated that the presentation was "worth the time".
3. All responses said that the anti-bullying message was clear.
4. Responses described the presentation as; professional, engaging and high energy

5. The only concern expressed was that one principle was concerned that the message was to fight the bullies back with words instead of taking the problem to an adult. I hope that is not the message the children got.

With this kind of feedback and the energy I noticed on the day of the performances I would say that this program was a huge success. The important thing is that we are not sitting around allowing bullies to continue to make our schools a caustic atmosphere for some students. We are providing our children with the tools to handle these situations and help these bullies see that there is a better way. If we get to them early, we might make a difference.

I know that your message was well received by all that saw it, now we can only hope that it sticks.
